ASALH continues that tradition by offering to the public speakers who can speak to a wide array of topics: slavery, the abolitionist movement, the struggle for equality, black women's history, the Civil Rights Movement, Black Power, the black military experience, economic empowerment, and many more.

Every year, in support of the National Black History Theme, the Association includes in the bureau a number of scholars who are ready and willing to address the theme before diverse audiences, ranging from government agencies and corporations, to student groups and scholarly conferences.
